Homeland Security & Emergency Service, Keeping 4-H'ers Safe!

The Office of Fire Prevention & Control (OFPC) and 4-H have a similar mission statement. Both are out to provide education to our communities but the subject matter of education varies between the two. For OFPC, the main goal is to talk about fire education and to get the word out on fire safety and what to do in case of a fire at home, school, work or even at The State Fair. For 4-H the focus of education is on healthy lifestyles, citizenship, and STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering, and Math). Pablo Davis of the Division of Homeland Security & Emergency Service gave a brief history of the OFPC coming to The Fair. In 2002 the Syracuse Fire Department, Firemen's Association of the State of New York (FASNY), Onondaga County Fire Service and the OFPC were asked to do some public education through Safety Town at the New York State Fair, including daily puppet shows, House of Hazards and other activities to help kids understand fire safety. At the six o' clock parade, the men and women of OFPC march with Sparky the Fire Dog, Freddy the Fire Truck, and a robotic fire hydrant.

At the New York State Fair there are four OFPC officers on duty. During the day they walk around The Fair doing fire checks and code enforcement. This year the OFPC started working with the Fair employees and teaching them fire safety. Before the Fair

opened the OFPC officers did a walk through the fairgrounds looking for fire safety issues.

Located on the Fairgrounds is a command post which is 34 feet long. This command post is the base for the OFPC. Every morning at 9 am a representative from each of the departments of The Fair have a meeting, including the garbage department.

The OFPC is also working along with the Solvay Fire Department and running on State Fair calls from their onsite fire house. When the OFPC goes to a call with Solvay on the Fairgrounds their duty is to help out with crowd control. Just before the interview OFPC Officer Davis and his partner came from helping to resolve a propane issue. During the interview with the OFPC guys had to leave and go on a call for a smell of something burning by the Coliseum. Shortly after that the Fire alarm in the 4-H Youth Building went off. As soon as everyone was entering the building, the alarm went off a 2nd time and a Deputy Chief of the Solvay Fire Department showed up and went thought the building. In the end, there was no fire, just the alarm went off.

Overall, the educational missions of 4-H and OFPC are similar, but thanks to OFPC's dedication to fire safety, youth working and sleeping in the 4-H Building are safer than ever!
